Minister's Letter

#### **Spring is here?**

As I sit here in my study, the last vestiges of the 2<sup>nd</sup> lot of snow this year is just melting from the ground. I can't help but think that the earth is just about to burst into life. The sun that shines this morning is encouraging the buds to develop, and it might be that in the week between when this piece is written and when you read it, Spring will really be here full of colour and life.

At the beginning of this month we will be celebrating the account of the resurrection, proclaiming the Risen Christ, the central theme of our Gospels. Each of the gospel writers have brought us to this point by a variety of routes, yet here they all are, at cross and the empty tomb. Of these things they are both untied and certain. Jesus died and is Risen. He has come to bring new life, to bring a new way, to bring hope and light into the world. Here at Easter we see the reality of the love of God in this message.

The Gospel reading from the Lectionary on the week before Palm Sunday start with the words:

Now there were some Greeks among those who went up to worship at the festival. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, with a request. "Sir," they said, "we would like to see Jesus." (John 12: 20-21)

This challenged me then and challenges me still. How do we show the good news of Jesus to those who come asking this question today? How will we enable others to 'see Jesus' through our Easter activities and beyond? Are we ready for the sort of new growth that might be the result of answering these questions?

My wish for us all is that as I write this message I could also say that our churches are set for Springtime, that they are just about to burst into life because of the good news of Easter.

#### **Easter offering**

This year the circuit Easter Offering service will take place at Brean at 4pm on Sunday April 29th, to be followed by a cup of tea and cake.

The theme this year is "Seek peace and pursue it". This was inspired by the fact that this year is the centenary of the end of World War 1, yet still today we have to strive to seek peace and pursue it.

As the notes accompanying the service state:-

"This act of worship shares stories from some of our mission partners; people called by God and sent to be part of local communities, using their gifts and talents to share God's love. They help to remind us that God's one mission is both local and global.

This service is a gift from the Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB) to the whole church; an act of worship, and also an opportunity to hear stories and respond both with money and with our lives, as we are challenged to be people of peace. Each year a different woman takes up the task and honour of being the lead writer. The 2018 service has been written mainly by Rachel Collins, the British Helen Kim Memorial Scholar (2011-2016) and a local preacher in the Ashton-Under-Lyne circuit."

All are invited to join in this service to celebrate the work of the World Church.

And a note of explanation. MWiB is part of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women. This covers Methodist Women's organisations world-wide, and has a major conference every five years. One of its founders was Helen Kim from Korea who had the initial vision of women working together to promote peace and better conditions for the whole world.

To commemorate her vision, every five years two Helen Kim scholars are selected from each of the nine areas into which countries round the world are grouped by the World Federation. These are women aged between 18 -30 with Christian commitment who show leadership potential. The scholarship is given to develop this potential within the Christian church.
