Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

As I write we have not yet quite entered the Advent season, yet the TV is already full of Christmas ads and the shops full of Christmas goods and decorations. Every year I read in the newspaper or hear on the radio someone decrying the commercialisation of Christmas yet we all contribute to it by buying our presents, food and decorations. It seems an inevitable tide that we are powerless to stop – a bit like King Canute ordering the tide to retreat!

I haven't started my Christmas shopping yet – I tend to do most of it online and then to rush out to the shops during the week before Christmas to get the rest – actually I think it was Christmas Eve last year!

For Julie and I Christmas will be a little different than in recent years – it's funny how we get into routines and moving to a new location tends to shake them up a bit. I wonder where we put the box of decorations when we moved in?

The gospels of Luke and Matthew tell us the story of Christmas – how Jesus was born of Mary in a stable (or does it? – look again!). But the gospels of Mark and John tell us nothing of Jesus' birth or early life and even Matthew is sketchy about the details. Perhaps for them the important thing was not the precise details surrounding Jesus' birth but who Jesus was.

The writer of Mark tells us that Jesus was God's son upon whom the Spirit descended like a dove and a voice from heaven declared his pleasure. Jesus came to proclaim the gospel – that the time had arrived – the kingdom of God had come upon us (Mark 1:15).

The writer of John tells us that Jesus was the word. The same word which spoke creation into being at the very beginning now comes to bring life and light to all people (John 1). Through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ we become a new

creation – and are able to participate in the life of love, truth, justice and peace which signify the kingdom of God.

This is what we celebrate at Christmas time – not just the birth of a baby but the coming of the one through whom the kingdom is revealed.

May you all have a joyful Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Harvey's Wanderings

URFA AND HARRAN

It was **hot**. We had reached Urfa at lunchtime. The temperatures had been pleasant up to then. Now it was into the mid and upper 90's. We had come off of the high mountain area of Anatolia and were into a wedge where the flat landscape of the Fertile Crescent reached up into the lower folds of the hills. But it was still three or four hundred feet above the surrounding plains.

In local tradition this has always been acknowledged as Ur, the birthplace of Abraham*. Below the citadel that dominates all before it, is the cave in which Abraham is said to have been born and now a place of pilgrimage for Muslims. Legend has it that the baby was kept hidden from Nimrod the hunter who was the Castellan, founder of the town and builder of the castle. But Nimrod discovered the child and cast him down from the hilltop into a furnace at the bottom of the hill. Or would have, except that the Almighty realised what was happening and in an instant turned the furnace into a large pool full of carp fish. The carp came together to form a liferaft and carried the baby to safety. The Almighty had his own purpose for Abraham; Nimrod was not going to spoil it!

On the day we were there, the Muslim festival of Ramadan was entering its fourth week, and the park was full of people come to venerate Abraham and enjoy the day together. We threaded our way through the crowds and marvelled at the huge quantity of fish swimming in the pool, many of immense size. Every now and again, someone would buy a bag of titbits from a seller and throw its contents into the pool; there would be a rush as part of the shoal came together all leaping up, mouths open out of the water, at the food being offered. We stood transfixed by this constantly changing kaleidoscope.

Unfortunately, the pond predates Abraham by a considerable margin and is instead more properly linked to one of the very ancient fertility cults of the Middle East.

What a shame! It's a good story and a reminder that Abraham is not simply a legendary hero for Jews and Christians.

On the next morning we followed the trail of Abram and drove out of the town and down on to the plains for the 25 miles journey to Harran out in

the Fertile Crescent. Nowadays it is doing what it can to nurture a tourist culture, for there are ruins from Byzantine as well as from Islamic cultures that are worth exploring. It was the seat of the first Islamic University, but today the greatest interest lies in the peculiarly shaped houses that populate the town. We went round one complex, consisting of several of these buildings all made out of dried adobe mud and all with their distinctive high structure like drawn out beehives to maintain a cool temperature even in the heat of summer. Power and water has been installed in recent years and it looked as though a degree of comfort could be enjoyed. The owner led us to believe that he and his family still lived there, though the guide books say that most residents now live in a more modern village a mile away.

Harran was a very ancient city, perhaps even older than Urfa and it was from here that in the Bible, Abram is said to have set out on his adventure to Canaan.

We returned to Urfa in the blazing heat of the day, and from there, as we looked down and across the flat lands to the distant shimmering south west horizon, we began to see in our mind's eye the journey that Abram, his family and all his flocks were to make away from the security that he knew, to an uncertain future, nurtured only by the blessing that God had promised him.

Matthew 4:19

Jennifer told of a Bible study she had held with one woman. The two were discussing Matthew 4:19, and the woman told Jennifer about a word in her native language, which means *follow*. She said, "It is the word for following closely, not at a distance.

To illustrate, Jennifer held up slippers used by the native women, showing one far behind the other. Then she moved one slipper right up against the back of the other one, and said that the word means "to follow right on one's heels." It suggests that we are to follow Jesus as closely as possible.

Later, when Jennifer was reading over the journal she had been keeping, she was surprised to see that she had often questioned, "Is Jesus enough?" She had been working her way through culture shock, loneliness, illness, and childlessness. At times she had felt far from Christ. But when through prayer and faith she had drawn as close to Him as she could, walking "right on His heels," He had calmed her soul, restored her strength, and given her peace. Are you feeling far from the Lord-empty, weak, and afraid? It's time to follow close on His heels.
