

#### Minister's Letter

#### **Dear Friends**

It is music festival time again and on the television, I have watched people queueing to get into venues. This week it has been the Glastonbury Festival, but this is just one of many during the summer. I am always surprised at how excited people are and how they are prepared to wait for hours, and sometimes for days, so that they can get the best seat, the best view. They get together and share their eagerness and excitement and somehow this keeps them warm. Most of all getting the front row experience makes the waiting worthwhile. I have never done such a thing. Have you?

There are few things, if any, I would be prepared to queue that long for. There are few things, if any, that I would anticipate with such excitement that I would be prepared to spend a cold wet night (as it normally is in this country) just to get a better view.

- Then I think of the anticipation of the Israelites waiting for the coming of the Messiah; their eagerness for God to move through the country and save God's people, a wait of centuries rather than days.
- Then I think of Jesus preaching on hillsides and in temples and I wonder about the excitement, anticipation, the wonder of the crowd. How long did they have to wait to get the best view on the hillside, the best seat in the synagogue? Would I have been prepared to queue or put myself out to hear the words of the Son of Man?
- Then I think of our worship. How eagerly do we anticipate each gathering? Do we have this sense of anticipation and excitement as we come together to worship God in his temple? How far will we put ourselves out as we celebrate all that God has done for us?

All this might sound a bit far fetched and I am not suggesting that people should queue overnight on a Saturday to get the best seat for Sunday worship (that's the back row in Methodism!), indeed worship as we know it might not be something we would even think of or imagine in this way. But is this right?

The Bible tells us that we are people made for worship and this should be our greatest desire and delight. If it isn't then we really should be wondering what we are doing wrong and how we can make it so. Because if it is not fulfilling for us, how can we expect it to be fulfilling for others.

# **BREAN**

On 8<sup>th</sup> September 1769 John Wesley preached at Brean. Well that is the firmly held view related down the years by the Hicks family even though documented proof cannot be established. It is a reasonable assumption though, since Wesley records visits to both Lympsham (where, on one occasion he fell off his horse into a rhine and had to be helped out) and Brent Knoll; and a view of an 18<sup>th</sup> Century map, in days when there was no north/south Coast Road, shows that access to both villages was surprisingly easy. On 8<sup>th</sup> September Wesley climbed to the top of Brent Knoll and declared 'I know not I ever saw such a prospect' and Rev. Bill Kemm, Anglican rector of Brean says in his book on Berrow and Brean at the end of the 1980s, that this was the most likely date for his visit. Whether this was the occasion for a full preached service or simply 'tea and a chat' is uncertain but Bill Kemm adds 'Wesley could have spent that night at Brean, for the next day his diary simply records "I returned to Bristol"

There was no Methodist Church as such during Wesley's time. Methodism was a movement within the Anglican church. William Hicks was churchwarden and he, with others had ventured up to Newgate prison, Bristol to see a hanging (which was a popular public event in those days – it disgusted and disturbed him). While there he

heard Wesley preach and invited the man to preach at Brean if he was ever in the vicinity.

After the visit, a preaching room was set up in Southfield Farm, was licenced for marriages in 1804, and continued there until 1847 when a cottage close to the present church was converted for use for Methodist worship and as a schoolroom. As Methodism split into different forms in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, the Brean community continued as Wesleyan Methodists. In 1932 the Wesleyan, Primitive and United Methodist churches combined to form the Methodist Church as it is today. The United Methodist Church itself had been formed in 1909, from other, smaller groups including the Bible Christians (as was the church at Brent Knoll).

Methodists continued to worship at the Anglican church on Sunday mornings until the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, joining for worship on their own premises on afternoons or evenings, often in congregations that overflowed the building. It was around the time of the 1932 Methodist Unity that the present church was built, the land having been gifted by members of the Hicks family.

So this year is the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Wesley's visit and Mark Topping is bringing his celebrated re-enactment of parts of Wesley's life to Brean Methodist Church on Saturday July 20<sup>th</sup> at 2.30pm. He has been performing this routine for 13years, in more than 175 churches and theatres. The drama looks at Wesley's adventurous life – including his confrontations with the drunken mobs which were frequently stirred up to disrupt his preaching.

It will be an entertaining afternoon and there will be tea afterwards. Please come if you can. Tickets can be obtained from Morag Wood on 01278 751660.

Elsewhere we have continued to welcome visitors to our midst throughout the summer so far and shall continue to do so in the months ahead.

We shall though be sad to see Fred and Berry depart for other pastures. Fred has been lead steward in the church and his handiwork was much in evidence in the upkeep of the property; Berry's handicrafts will also be much missed. Both have added much to the

positive and friendly atmosphere in the church. Berry has not been well recently and has needed hospital treatment, so this move, to a smaller property at Thornbury, near Bristol, comes at an appropriate time. We wish you both well, Fred and Berry, and thank you for all that you have contributed to the work of the church at Brean.

Our services in July and August are all in our church at 10.30am except for the one on July 14<sup>th</sup> when we meet at St Bridget's at 9.15am
