

Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

What is your favourite prayer? As you enter the season of Lent, I want to ask you this question. I once came across this prayer which I quite like:

So far today, God, I've done all right. I haven't gossiped, I haven't lost my temper, I haven't been greedy, grumpy, nasty, selfish, or over-indulgent. I'm doing quite well today. But in a few minutes, God, I'm going to get out of bed and from then on I'm probably going to need a lot more help. Amen.

How about this one:

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread,

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil For thine is the Kingdom, the power and the glory forever and ever Amen

It has been estimated that on any Easter Sunday up to 2 billion people will say this prayer in various forms. That statistic alone should cause us to regularly reflect on what it says. But although the Lord's Prayer is of course something we have all said hundreds of times, how often do we stop to think what it is we are praying? One commentator writes

'Although it is prayed by all Christians, it never once mentions Christ. Although it is prayed by all churches, it never once mentions church. Although it is prayed on all Sundays, it never once mentions Sunday. It is called the Lord's Prayer, but never once mentions Lord. It is prayed by Congregational, Presbyterian, Episcopalian and Catholic Christians, but never once mentions congregation, priest, bishop or pope. It is prayed by Christians who split from one another over this or that doctrine, but it never once mentions a single one of those doctrinal issues. It is prayed by Christians who focus on what

it never mentions, and it is also prayed by Christians who ignore what it says.'

This is the Lord's Prayer, a prayer that is deserving of more than a brief thought this Lent.

World day of Prayer



And don't forget, coffee in our church every Monday at 10.30am. And yes we have had people come out from as far away as Burnham.



OUR LINK AND CIRCUIT

Part 3 - September 1975 to 1976

In the Church Year 1975-76 the Circuit meeting gathered on only two occasions, in September and March. This was the legal minimum under the new structures. The arrangement was to last for five or six years before our Methodist love of committees broke through and we reverted to the traditional four gatherings a year.

In September 1975, the fifty people at the Circuit Meeting welcomed Deaconess Pat Gregory and Revered Alan Hale to the circuit. Pat joined the staff to continue the excellent work that Phyllis Maland had undertaken in the Circuit; and Alan had received permission to serve the church outside the Circuit system in that he was now to be Assistant Head of 6th form at Broadoak school in Weston-super-Mare.

At the end of the period the circuit bade farewell to Rev Peter Philipson and his family amid many plaudits for his work within the circuit, but especially from the churches in the Link end. Peter next went to The Forest of Dean Circuit before being stationed in Newquay and where he sadly died while still serving. A nice man, a gentle giant (he was a large man), as I remember.

During the year, two new Local Preachers moved into the Circuit, Miles Dawes and Tim Lansdown. Miles was elderly and blind and lived in Weston. He no longer took services, though he sometimes helped out with prayers, but he maintained a valuable ministry in the way that he supported and encouraged others. Tim came as Assistant Manager of Lloyds Bank (at Highbridge I think) and over the next ten years he and his family were to become valuable assets to the development of the society at Burnham, and supportive to the Link as a whole. Around 1986 he then moved to another bank appointment. When Rev Terry Isherwood died a couple of years ago Tim was asked to give one of the eulogies at Terry's funeral.

Finance

As now, finance dominated much of the discussion at meetings. The Treasurer strongly urged members who paid tax, to add to the value of their offering by using the Tax covenanting principle, and he showed how the Circuit and Churches could gain through this system. This was an opportunity strongly supported at Connexional level too.

There was a voluntary aspect to Circuit Assessments and to meet the stresses that were arising, Brean was selected for particular thanks for agreeing to raise its contribution by 10%.

The cost of producing the Circuit Plan was rising considerably. Until then, for each Quarter, a 24 page booklet was issued costing 6d and subsidised by advertisements on alternate pages. It must have been time consuming to produce. It was printed by a firm in Kent which must have also added to administrative time and cost. The Circuit Meeting agreed to set up a group to look at what alternatives there might be.

(I have added a further item about the Circuit Plan of this period, at the end of this summary)

Ecumenical

The Ecumenical work at Worle was beginning to take shape. A joint Anglican/Methodist council was set up and an Ecumenical Magazine was produced for distribution. Rev W S Terry a supernumerary minister was appointed to supplement the pastoral work of the parish.

Roy Wareing was the leading Methodist figure in this development and worked long and hard over the next few years to bring the project into fruition. Worle was to be the first Anglican/Methodism Covenant in the Bath and Well Diocese.

Missions and Ministries of various kinds

There seems to have been a stronger bond between Circuit and Connexional departments.

Ben Boulter, the Circuit Secretary for Christian Citizenship, now termed Department for Social Responsibility (DSR), reported that the Connexional Department was producing a new publication, and this was widely distributed among the churches most of whom had their own SR secretaries; however he subsequently had to report that a price increase in the magazine had resulted in a reduction in those buying it, so I wonder whether this might have been a re-vamping of an existing

publication rather than a totally new one. The date of the Christian Citizenship Sunday was announced on which date the new District Chairman (Rev Ian Lunn) would be taking a Circuit Service. The Methodist Homes for the Aged was now being taking under the wing of the Department too. Each church was expected to contribute £3.50 for every 100 members to the running of the Department.

Christian Citizenship dealt with the rightness and wrongness of our society in days that were (ever so slightly?) less tolerant than they are now and a resolution from Women's Fellowship (WF)meeting at Uphill reflected concern about 'the many Television programmes where SEX – BAD LANGUAGE and VIOLENCE seem to dominate, thus corrupting the minds of our Young People.' (The capitals are as written in the Minutes). A petition was proposed for submission via DSR, but it was noted that it needed as many as 100,000 signatures to be effective, though the Division may have had similar appeals from around the Connexion and they could all be put together. The situation had also been discussed at District level and many individuals had written to their MPs.

It may seem, looking back, that times have moved on and the church too, but it is perhaps, good to reflect the passion with which members of church were involved in the ways of society. Some years ago, Robin Jenks tried to get an open forum set up where issues of the day could be discussed, but his other responsibilities prevented him from getting the project firmly off the ground.

Women's meetings were also very strong with support from all parts of the Circuit. Reports were made on Women's Fellowship (WF) District meetings in Bristol and a Retreat that was held at Almondsbury. A proposal was made that the WF and Women's Work (WW) consider whether there was merit in combining the Circuit meetings into one Women's Fellowship.

And finally...

The year was to be the final goodbye to Berrow church but such farewell was put on hold for a while when the application to change the

premises into accommodation was refused by the Council and further work was necessary to get the plans agreed. Better news at East Brent though when the circuit gave permission for a new organ to be purchased. It is still in use today

A PLAN DIVERSION

Eventually the Circuit Meeting agreed that changes be made to the design of the Plan and how it was produced. I have a copy of the Plan for October to December 1969 (the Plan followed the calendar year in those days) and it includes a lot of information - names, addresses and phone numbers of all Clergy, and officers of Circuit and every Church for example. Other details included the number of members of each church, the latest Financial Statement from the Circuit accounts, circuit notices, details of meetings and any travel arrangements for preachers. It is salutary to realise that even in that comparatively recent time, a good number of preachers were without their own transport. In that quarter, for example, the entry for 21st December alone reads 'Rev J O Clutterbuck takes Mr Balfour (to Lympsham), Dr. Wigfield (to Brent Knoll), Mrs Coles to Berrow for Brean' Mr Clutterbuck was preaching at Berrow that day and so I assume that someone from Brean would have had to go to Berrow to collect Mrs Coles. And that was by no means all. Fortunately, morning services were universally timed at 11 o'clock in those days, so this will have helped. Years later the system was replaced by the host church having to go to pick up the preacher from his/her home, and as cost of petrol rose, I remember Brean at least, complaining about the cost and time involved if the preacher came from, say Worle.

Interestingly, most churches at the Link end of the Circuit also had a midweek service (Burnham on most weeks and East Brent, Brent Knoll, Brean and Mark, once a month).

That Plan for 1969 also shows Berrow of course but there are other churches shown that might not be familiar. Sunnyside for example was a Methodist Church in Weston situated between the railway and Drove Road. That closed in 1969. Hill Road, Mark and Heath House churches were to close many years later so more of them anon, and Bournville morphed into St Andrew's when eventually it joined with the Anglican church in an ecumenical covenant.

Harvey Allen
