



#### Minister's Letter

#### **Dear Friends**

One of my favourite types of jokes are church bloopers. These are lists of things on Church notice sheets from around the world. One of my favourites is:

"This being Easter Sunday, we will ask Mrs. Lewis to come forward and lay an egg on the altar."

Sometimes we say one thing, but people can hear our words entirely differently. The same happened in Jesus' day. Jesus told the disciples what would happen to him in Jerusalem, but the crucifixion and resurrection was still a surprise. Jesus preached about the kingdom of God and as people heard the words they weaved in their own expectations. Rather than hearing what Jesus was saying, they heard what they wanted to hear. This is not unique to the people of that time, we do it ourselves all the time. We read stories in the Bible and interpret them in a particular way, bringing our own expectations and understandings and indeed our own faith to the Bible story. In this there has always been a danger, both in the institutional church and in our own personal discipleship, to create God in our image, rather than the other way around!

Those of us who met on Brean Down at 6am on Easter Sunday morning had the privilege of watching a remarkable sunrise this year. But we did not meet for our own gratification. We met to remember that on the first Easter Day, the third day, the moment of sunrise after the long night, there was a time of new meetings, those with the risen Christ. These new times brought hope of reconciliation and a new commission for the disciples; the beginning of a new creation.

Perhaps what the resurrection stories tell us is that we sometimes need to encounter something in such an earth-shattering new way, that it breaks through our own expectations and understandings. As our Easter season continues, I hope that all of us will meet the risen Christ in earth-shattering new ways. I hope that what we find in the garden, or on the road to Emmaus, or in the upper room, is not just someone who might comfort us, but the risen Christ who wants to remake us.

## Do you remember Cyclone Adai?

Torrential rain and wind hit Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe on 15<sup>th</sup> March. Many of you will have seen that Beira, Mozambique's second city, was flattened by the cyclone and that vast areas were flooded, affecting around two million people. I travelled in the affected area when the rivers were mere trickles; seeing a news item from Inchope, which had been turned into an island by the vast new lake made me recall how dry and dusty that area was when I passed through. It is difficult to cope with extremes.

Chikwawa district was one of the areas badly hit in Malawi. I headed up a water safety initiative there in the 1990s; I wonder how much the people remembered from that time when the waters rose. 187 evacuation camps have been set up in southern Malawi and schools and churches have also been used for temporary accommodation.

I know the area around Chimanimani in Zimbabwe well, as I used to take school pupils on expeditions up the nearby mountains and had a number of friends living there. The BBC report from there showed boulders in the centre of the town that were not there a few years ago, so I suspect there has been a major landslide due to the cyclone. The area was completely cut off because of bridges that had been swept away.

A month after the cyclone many of the roads are now passable, the number of new cases of cholera, typhoid and diarrhoea are diminishing, and many people who are able have started to return to their home areas. However, there is still a vast amount of international help needed and

Christian Aid is one of the charities that form the Disasters Emergency Committee (DEC) that has made a national appeal for donations. I hope that you will be reminded of this human situation when you come to think about Christian Aid Week this year.

Sierra Leone is the world's most dangerous place to become a mum. Every day 10 women die from giving birth. In Sawula district, the community struggle with a clinic which has no electricity and only two delivery beds.

The picture shows Tenneh and her nurse, Judith playing with her 3

month old baby Ansumana. Thankfully he is a happy, bouncy baby. Sadly, Tenneh has loved and lost another baby before. When Tenneh's labour started during her 1<sup>st</sup> pregnancy, there was no health centre in the village, she had to use the traditional birth attendant. She fell unconscious and bleed heavily, with no medical training the attendant was out of her depth. Tenneh was very weak after the birth and her baby was not strong enough to feed properly and died when he was a few weeks old. Through their partner organisation RADA Christian Aid began funding work in the village to help improve access to health care and improve basic hygiene by raising the profile of handwashing. Please look out for those distinctive red and white envelopes coming through your doors. Please be as generous as you can, so we can help to make childbirth safer for the world's poorest mums and babies.
